Psalms and Rhythm of Life: Orientation, Disorientation, Reorientation

The OT Scholar Walter Brueggemann has developed a very helpful way of categorizing the Psalms and bringing them into our own personal lives. Brueggemann suggests that we regularly find ourselves in one of three places:

- a place of orientation, in which everything makes sense in our lives;
- a place of disorientation, in which we feel we have sunk into the pit; and
- a place of new orientation, in which we realize that God has lifted us out of the pit and we are in a new place full of gratitude and awareness about our lives and our God.

Brueggemann suggests that the psalms generally match those places, and that there are psalms of orientation, disorientation, and new orientation. Recognizing this pattern of organization can help us identify psalms that fit our personal lives.



Remember:

- Psalms are Songs or Poems
- This list is not exhaustive, and the categories are not divinely inspired or authoritative.
- Psalms of Orientation For those times when the world is well-ordered, reliable, and everything is going great
 - > Creation Psalms– in which we consider the world and our place in it

- Psalms of Reorientation For those times when God's grace fills us with thanks and wonder:
 - > Psalms of Thanksgiving in which we thank God for what God has done for us/me

 - Individual Thanksgiving: Psalms 18, 21, 30, 32, 34, 40:1-11, 66:13-20, 92, 108, 116, 118, 138
 - ▶ Hymns of Praise in which we praise God for who God is

 - Songs of Zion in which we praise God for His presence in the ancient city of Jerusalem, and the way it points to His presence at the center of the Kingdom of God.

 - Royal/Enthronement Psalms in which we consider the role of Kings in Ancient Israel, but more importantly how that Kingship is fulfilled and made prefect in the rule of Jesus our Messiah King

 - Covenant Renewal in which we renew our relationship with God
